"So he told me. Let me ask you this, what are you counting on for your salvation?"

"Well, a hymn we sing all the time puts it, 'by His blood and righteousness'. I have called upon God the Father, in a heart of true repentance, to apply the sacrifice Jesus made on the cross for my sins. "When I was your age, I really had no understanding as to what water baptism was really all about. Mr. Tom continued his lesson, "Mike, to understand this, we have to think back to the Old Testament and come to an understanding of things the way they did. We are talking 'water' here. In ancient biblical thought, water carried a number of meanings.

"We know it meant 'life', for Jesus spoke of that often and we see it in the New Testament, but it also carried the symbolism of humanity as a whole. The Psalms makes this really clear. The seas, specifically, are humanity.

"In the Psalms we see the seas are locked in their confines, the sea-beds, by God's command. These seas froth in mighty waves upward, i.e. heavenward.

"We also see that God sits as king upon the waters. He ultimately controls humanity. That is just a touch on the surface of water. I hope I haven't lost you yet?"

Mr. Tom continued, "Good, that lays a foundation for the next step. Look in your Bibles in Genesis 1:6-8:

"6 And God said, Let there be a firmament in the midst of the waters, and let it divide the waters from the waters. 7 And God made the firmament, and divided the waters which were under the firmament from the waters which were above the firmament: and it was so. 8 And God called the firmament Heaven. And the evening and the morning were the second day.

"Verse 9 continued the settling of the waters into seas, those bounds I spoke of.

"So here's the clincher:

"Humanity is earth bound, as those seas. It rages against God in rebellion to His will. The waves roar heavenward, foaming, but fall back to their confines on earth. They can do no more against God in heaven.

"The saved of humanity are like the clouds. When we are saved, spiritually we are transformed. Before, we can only get as high heavenward as the waves can toss,

but never reach God. It takes a work of God to transform our nature, and like the water, exposed to the light of the sun we evaporate and ascend heavenward to become part of the waters above the firmament.

"Take a look at 1 Corinthians 10:1-2: 1 Moreover, brethren, I would not that ye should be ignorant, how that all our fathers were under the cloud, and all passed through the sea; 2 And were all baptized unto Moses in the cloud and in the sea;

"Do you see the parallel in these verses? The picture of Israel being redeemed from Egypt, a type of the world that rages against God's people. They had to go through the sea, but were kept safe. Moses carried them through to safety; Noah's ark kept him and his family safe through the waters and finally; Jesus carries us safe through the waters. That will be culminated at the fulfillment of the coming out of the waters at the first resurrection.
